AWS BOARD MINUTES JANUARY 15, 2026



Meeting was called to order at 10:33 a.m. by President Linda L. Reid.

Board Members Present: Linda L. Reid, Judy Boles, Gail Mardfin, Allene Donato, Judy McFarland, Deni Marrone, Merrie Krisl, Carol Mills, Susan Nestor, Judy Pagnusat, Fran Nielsen, Sarah Hegarty, and Pamela Nachtigall

Others Present: Lorraine Stribling and Julia Hansen

- **Minutes:** Susan Nestor moved that the minutes of the last meeting in November be accepted as published. Motion was seconded by Merrie Krisl. Motion passed.
- **Swearing In:** Linda Reid announced the new Board will be sworn in at the general meeting today.
- **Officer and Committee Job Descriptions:** Linda Reid has compiled the job descriptions in a binder and these are available to review. Gail will be adding shortened versions of job descriptions to the website.
- **Food Signups:** There was discussion about there not being enough food at potlucks. Sarah Hegarty will make sure the sign-up sheet gets passed along during the meeting and that all slots get filled. Judy Pagnusat moved that in order to show in the ABS, the food requirement be raised from 3 to 4, beginning in April for the 2027 ABS. Gail Mardfin seconded the motion. Motion passed. The food sign-up sheet will be modified to increase the number of savory foods and reduce the number of desserts.



- **Membership:** Judy McFarland reported that, due to attrition, 12 people on the waiting list will be accepted into membership in January. She will be collecting their information and dues at the meeting today.
- **“Mark Makers’ Quarterly”:** Linda Reid reported that she submitted an article to the magazine about AWS. It will hopefully be published in the January issue.
- **Overstock Sale:** Carol Mills will direct the setting up as donations arrive. Susan Nestor and Judy Pagnusat will help Merrie Krisl with the cash boxes.
- **December Holiday Party:** Thank you to Carol Mills for the set up and decorations. The party was well attended and the art exchange went smoothly. Thank you to Gail Mardfin for the great coverage in the January Newsletter.
- **Apple Blossom Show:** The show will be April 25th and 26th. Allene Donato created a display of the maximum space allowed per participant. Maximum 3 art pieces and maximum 1200 square inches, including the frames. Applications will be ready for the February meeting and must be postmarked no later than April 8th. Gail Mardfin will update the information sheets and they will be ready to the February meeting. Volunteer sign-up sheets will also be ready for February.
- **Treasurer:** Merrie Krisl presented the Income/Expense statement for 2025. We have \$9081.33 in our general account and \$4603.13 in the Mielke awards account.
- **Programs:** Sarah Hegarty suggested that we block off a parking space for future presenters so they do not have to tote their equipment/supplies too far. It was agreed that idea should be adopted. Sarah reported that we still need a few presenters for 2026.
- **Publicity:** Pamela Nachtigall will be updating the e-calendars and will be working on ABS publicity.

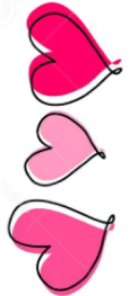
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AWS BOARD MINUTES (continued)

- **Lucky Bags:** Susan Nestor reported the gift certificate to RileyStreet has been increased from \$15 to \$20.

President Linda Reid adjourned the meeting at 11:24 AM.

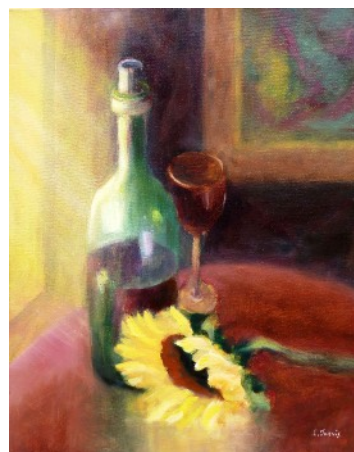

Important Apple Blossom Show Info

You may enter 1, 2, or 3 pieces that together must fit into a space of 1,200 square inches INCLUDING FRAMES (and have a depth of no more than 4"). Multiply height times width of outside framed edge of each entry to figure the square inches of each piece. Then add all together; total cannot exceed 1,200 square inches. **3D work** must have a footprint of 12x12" or less.

The ABS Info Sheet and Entry Form were emailed to you on January 30. Please print these materials on your home printer.

JANUARY PROGRAM: THE BUSINESS OF ART

Presented & written by Gail Mardfin

After being in AWS for awhile, I thought a program on the topic, THE BUSINESS OF ART, would be of benefit to many, and I offered to lead it in 2023.

This was an updated reprise of that presentation, and I was pleased nearly 70 people stayed to hear my talk. Thank you for staying overtime!

AWS has several commercially successful members and I had earlier communicated with several of them, so I was able to share their expertise with the group. Many relevant topics were covered, and attendees followed along with a 4-page handout on which to take notes. **If you would like a PDF of the handout, please email me at awsomeart2023@gmail.com**

Keep track of your work – it's a new year, a great time to start! Maintain a spreadsheet or notebook where, by date and/or medium, you record all your work as soon as you finish it, including title, size, and price, and keep track of venues it appears in or awards it receives. I advise leaving the date off the front of a piece.

Take a good picture of it before you frame it under glass – hold camera squarely over or in front of the piece, not skewed, and create a place on your phone/laptop to store your photos so you can find them when you need them! **Elizabeth Springs** uses this organizing site, where she has scored a lifetime 20% discount for AWS members: <https://www.artworkarchive.com/awsomeart>

Present your work in a professional manner.

Check that your work is clean (front and back) and wired properly, and be careful as you store or move it. Carry/store work back-to-back and front-to-front with spacers in between to avoid damage, especially to frames.

Pricing your work - There are a few different methods people use to price their work. There is no one way, but as a beginner, look around at comparable work, and *don't sell your work for a price that will leave you resentful*. If someone thinks your work is too expensive, offer to sell it on a payment plan.

Other ways to sell your work is by making prints, cards, and giclées (*giclée = to spurt* in French, as in inkjet!). Several people mentioned the fine services at the **Fed Ex, 4th Street, Santa Rosa** and **Sprint in Sebastopol**.

Copyright - Having attended some in-depth lectures about copyright, I really encourage you to work from

your own reference photos, but if you are going to work from images that are “out there,” I advise changing things significantly to make it your own. A good website to find millions of royalty-free images is commons.wikimedia.org. Understand that if you are in a juried show, you must own the photo you worked from or have permission to use it.

Commissions - A show of hands proved many members have done commissions. Especially if it is with someone you do not know personally, get paid half upfront and put your agreement in writing. Agree beforehand on the medium, size, price, and timeframe.

Self-Promotion/Marketing Materials - Keep your promotional materials (business cards, wall labels, promotional cards) consistent and easy to read, showing your best work or work representative of your style and/or range of subject matter. When ordering, remember the cost goes down per piece the more you get – and use both sides. [Vistaprint.com](https://vistaprint.com) is a good place to start.

Your Email list is the most reliable way to engage with more people. Set up your Contacts in separate folders. Add friends, family, and people you meet in daily life with whom you can keep informed via simple news/announcements with art images. Sales from websites most often happen right after a newsletter has been released, jogging people to take a look.

Entering shows - There are so many opportunities in the area! Watch for announcements in the newsletter. Usually there is an entry fee and a commission on sales through galleries, something to consider when pricing your work. Participating in an open studio tour or outdoor show can be very rewarding, a lot of work, and a lot of fun. [Entrythingy.com](https://entrythingy.com) allows you to see Calls for Entry from all over.

Payment - Being able to accept credit cards or online payment is crucial, and a good way to AVOID scams. Check out the free apps, **Venmo** and **Square**.

Online presence/Websites - We looked at several members' websites and heard the benefits of various website hosting/creation programs. You need to purchase a domain (BeverlyBirdArt.com for

example) - check out godaddy.com. You also need a platform to host it; costs range from free to \$300+ a year. To me, it seems FASO.com offers the best full-service plans for artists, with a number of professional looking templates to choose.

Currently, most AWS artists do *not* have a website, but many members post their work on **Instagram** and/or **Facebook**.

About half of current AWS members *do* have an online presence at www.awsomeart.org/members-artwork, however! You can submit/update your work once a year; watch for announcements.

Co-op galleries - There is a yearly cost to be a member, with different tiers of membership. A percentage of each sale (20-50%) is taken. Our area has several to check out, with members who can tell you more...

Tax Business - You *are* a business in California the minute you sell one painting, no need or requirement to register. And you should pay income tax on your art sales.

In CA, you can easily get a Seller's Permit/Resale Certificate (at no cost; never have to renew) and collect sales tax when you sell your work within the state. (This is required to participate in Sebarts' Open Studio Tours, FYI). You don't pay sales tax when buying supplies, but you do submit online quarterly/annual reports and pay the sales tax there. <https://www.cdtfa.ca.gov/>
