Hello "august" AWS artists!

Our July meeting had a lot of art stuff going on! Besides the member's art displayed to share, our guest artist brought a collection of her wonderful work.

Also taking place was a surprise giveaway of bequeathed art materials, thanks to the family of our recently-departed member, Chris McNamara. Thanks to all who helped make that happen.

Our program, a collage demonstration by local artist, Catherine Cruz, probably inspired many of us to get some of that Polycrylic, a couple of sturdy paint brushes, and try some collage making when we got back to our studios. That's what I was *planning* to do.

What is it all about, this putting off doing something you should really want to do?

I intended to spend lots of time on my art this week. I had an idea in mind and believed I was excited to pick up a brush, fill my water tubs and get busy.

However, noticing my workroom had been hit by a bomb cyclone, I spent precious time shoveling off the drawing table, puttering papers into their proper piles, then of course, the tape residue needed scraping from my cutting mat. After rearranging tubes of acrylic head to toe, so they fit nicely in their box, I determined the grungy dried paint crust must be removed from all the screw tops. I kinda lost my creative momentum. What is my problem?

Could it be procrastination? Do I suffer from fear of failure or judgment or more likely that pesky perfectionism. Perhaps a bit. In Rick Rubin's book, *The Creative Act: A Way of Being,* I found a clue to this behavioral mystery. If it isn't procrastination, it could be considered unconsciously chosen distraction. Ah ha! Rubin writes, "Distraction is one of the best tools available to the artist, when used skillfully... sometimes it's the only way to get where we are going."

We artists aren't always in the mood. Maybe we have only the beginnings of an idea and it needs to mentally percolate. Things aren't conducive. We're not ready. What can we do?

Any simple mind-easy activity, like washing dishes, walking around the block, pulling weeds, dancing about the living room or some sun salutations and down dogs, keeps one part of the mind busy and allows a different part to receive and retrieve from our subconscious. Getting out in the world - even if it's only down the street and around the corner - refreshes our perspective. Being immersed in natural surroundings, walking among trees in a forest or on the beach along the ever changing sea relaxes the mind into a receptive state when inspiration can be allowed a chance.

Back in the day...way, waaaaaay back... was fretting about whether to take a weekend off from my ceramics class work and join a group of fellow students to enter a car painting contest. I was working as much as I could on my clay creations and thought I should just keep my nose to the pottery wheel. My professor advised me to get out, take a break, have some fun and I would return to my work with more creative energy. He was quite right. By the way, we won that contest!

Sometimes it's good to just relax....refresh.....restart.



July Artist Demonstration: Catherine Cruz

Catherine Cruz, painter and art instructor, has spent the last six years exploring abstract COLLAGE. She shares her time between Sebastopol and Valence, France. Catherine teaches workshops for SebARTs and other arts organizations in the area, as well as in France.

She received a BS in Interior Design from Florida State University in 1993 and pursued a successful career as a residential and commercial interior designer for 25 years, followed by a second career as a green building consultant. Catherine studied color theory, drawing and painting in college and private studies, but thinks of herself as self-taught.

Catherine began her demo by reviewing the materials used. She works in acrylics. For the "glue" used to paste down collage materials, she uses Liquitex matte medium, or to leave a shiny surface, gloss medium. She shared samples of the collage sheets that she makes using many tactile textures and colors. "Using your own collage material gives your work authenticity," she stated.

Catherine works on both canvas and board. Her favorite shape is a square or circle. She says, "The process of building layers of collage is where the fun is!" She likes to use her own painted papers that she has created on newsprint or other types of paper. Sometimes she sands the collage in between multiple layers, to create visual and tactile texture.

Her process begins by putting a layer of gesso on whatever surface she is using. Then she pours the "glue" (Liquitex matte medium) over the entire surface, and brushes the backs of her selected collage papers with the medium, pastes it down, and then brushes the medium over the top. It is important to push any bubbles out. On larger pieces, she uses Minwax water-based Polycrylic as a glue and varnish (clear satin finish).

China markers (aka grease pencils), oil pastels, graphite sticks, and other mark-making tools can be used to draw over the collage, and of course, you can paint on top of the glued collage. More layers of collage can be added until you are satisfied with the result. To finish the work, she might varnish or put a layer of cold wax medium over the top.

Catherine brought many samples of her work and everyone in attendance was surely inspired to try their own collage painting! Her tip: Select a color palette, apply paper intuitively, then once you have a good base, focus on composition.




Saturday, October 14th, One-Day AWS Art Show in Santa Rosa

YUPO is a polypropylene "synthetic paper" often used with alcohol inks. I asked Barbara what it was like to use it with watercolors. -gm

She replied:

Yupo can be frustrating because when you want to layer, the wet paint can push away the dry layer below. On the positive side, you can easily lift to get whites (like feathers) and colors can merge with a nice effect. Also you can rinse the paint off and start fresh so you don't have to
