AWS BOARD MINUTES SEPTEMBER 18, 2025

Meeting Called to order 10:28 a.m. by President Linda L. Reid

Discussion:

- <u>Peacetown:</u> Patricia Marina made a book for Jim Corbett with photos of each week as a thank you. The artists participating took in over \$2000 [donating 10% to Peacetown]. Participants enjoyed the show, though it was a lot of work. They want to participate again next year.
- <u>Finley Center Art Show</u>: Gail Mardfin reported that there will be 66 members [update: 68] participating. She will be in touch with artists about food for the reception. There will be no alcohol. Gail has sent pdf flyers to all participants and a jpg of the flyer for posting on the web. There was a \$90 expense to print the flyers, but additional costs will be under \$100. Flyers will be on the back table for members to take and hang after the meeting today.
- <u>Historical Documents</u>: Merrie Krisl and her husband have digitized all documents that were on floppy discs. There is one box of old documents that Linda Reid will store at her house. Merrie will digitize all future docs and contracts on thumb drives. Gail Mardfin will save the digital newsletters on a thumb drive.
- Constitution: Gail Mardfin posted the changes in last month's newsletter regarding membership and will summarize the changes at the general membership meeting today and call for a vote. [NOTE: The changes were unanimously approved by the membership at the general meeting.]
- Membership: Judy McFarland emailed a current roster to all members and will promote renewing membership early. Checks mailed to her must be postmarked by December 31st. Dues paid in cash must be in an envelope with the member's name on it. We do not accept payment by credit card, Venmo or the Square.
- <u>Nominating Committee</u>: Judy Goldberg has agreed to head the committee, but needs a couple
 of volunteers to help. [Note: Gail Mardfin will serve.] The slate of nominees will be announced at
 the October general meeting and voting will take place at the November meeting.
- **Treasurer Report:** Merrie Krisl reported that we are still waiting on the IRS response to reinstate AWS as a non-profit. [Note: After the meeting, Merrie notified the Board that she got the IRS response when she got home and that non-profit status has been re-instated!] The general account has \$7082.02 and the Mielke awards account has \$4600.06.
- Programs: Lonna Necker reminded the board that today's prompt is "Pairs/Pairings" and the
 demonstrator will be Teri Sloat showing how she incorporates stories into her pastel art.
 October's prompt will be "Blues: Color or Feeling." In October, Judy Pagnusat will demonstrate
 how to make origami books. She will have 30 kits available and will have written directions for all
 members to take home.
- · <u>Venues</u>: Deni Marrone reported that all venues are rolling along smoothly, except for The Livery. SebArts will have an Emerging Artists show from 10/27/25 through year end. AWS artists who

signed up for this time period will be put on the January list. Artists currently in The Livery must take down their art by 10/27/25. Deni will be talking with management at The Livery about how our venue calendar works and that we need longer notice when a show is booked outside of AWS.

- · **Publicity**: Patricia Marina will begin publicity for the Finley Center Show on Saturday.
- Apple Blossom Show: Allene Donato has measured all the space available for the show, including the addition of another panel. Due to increased membership, Allene recommends each participant be limited to 1200 square inches for the next show. This is 528 square inches less than last year. The board agreed. Allene will call for a show of hands at the general meeting to see how many members are planning to participate. The limitation may be adjusted as the date gets closer.
- · Correspondence: Fran Nielsen sent out one card last month.
- **Raffle:** Susan Nestor reported we will have two prize bags today. She will ask for more donations in the newsletter.
- Hospitality: Judy McFarland brought up the shortage of food signups for September's meeting, and thanks the board members who brought in additional food for the potluck today. It is recommended that, before adjourning the general meeting, we should ensure the food signup sheet for the next meeting has been filled. [NOTE: After an appeal by Stan Healy at the general meeting, there was a FULL signup for October's potluck.]

President Linda L. Reid closed the meeting at 11:28 am.



Bob Cheal had this to say, "This is a piece that I did. Do you like it?" Followed by resounding applause!!





SEPTEMBER ART DEMO: Teri Sloat - Bringing Story Into Pastel

AWS members were in for a treat with Teri Sloat's pastel painting demo. Like the Pied Piper, she led her audience on an exciting path to an imaginative painting experience. Calling on her experience as a storyteller and illustrator, she showed how her work evolved into fine art. She was generous in letting us in on her processes and secrets to attaining the rich, lustrous paintings filled with color, humanity, and intriguing story.

Starting with a dark panel, she added pastel in broad strokes, using earthy colors to create the first layer of a landscape scene. At this point one could deduce a scene with two large areas – sky and land, the sky area dark blue and the land orange and browns. Once finished with this application of pastel, she used an old brush to apply rubbing alcohol to the overall surface, creating texture in the process. [1] Allowing this to dry is the next step (it didn't take long).

Once dry, she began adding some of the lighter earth tones – beiges to oranges – to define some of the shapes in the landscape, including a hint of water. One could see a pathway moving up a hill emerge. She worked the land to further define shapes and foliage markings. Eventually, she revealed she would be adding a figure and a fox – foxes play a big role in Teri's art. And with a few strokes, a figure was created followed by the fox companion. [3]

Inspiration and creative process: Teri's early experience living in Alaska was transformative. She was called on to paint scenes from the Yupik culture, which led to her work as a children's

book illustrator. She enjoyed creating a world and making that world believable. (She noted that it helped being the only artist in 500 miles.) That rich cultural experience continues to inspire and inform

her work. Nowadays, she uses technology to help with the creative process, specifically the app, Procreate, on her tablet. [2] The reference for her demo piece was created on Procreate, which she likes, as it allows lots of experimenting until one gets things just right.

PASTELS: Teri loves soft rich color – lots of color. She cautioned against cheaper pastels since they have more binder and are less color saturated. She mentioned

several brands: Blue Earth = very soft; Schmincke = rich color, which she prefers over Sennelier; Terry Ludwig. She described her palette as earthy and she loves red. She uses a carving approach with the pastel for broad and linear strokes.

SURFACES: She used an Ampersand Sanded Board for the demo; she also uses UArt pastel paper, 300 grit).

APPLICATION TOOLS: Hands (in latex gloves), but does not blend too much; stiff old brushes and palette knives to add texture.

FINISHING: Krylon varnish – she does not believe it diminishes the painting to varnish it.

Teri's presentation was an inspiration, encouraging AWS artists to take time to let the ideas come, as she did when she was surrounded by miles upon miles of tundra. She explains that her art is always about telling a story.

Her credentials are strong: Teri has published 25 books, exhibited widely, and is a long-time participant in the Sonoma County Art Trails Open Studio Tours (this year, stop #21). One

exciting project is the mural in the tasting room at Gold Ridge Organic Farms – check out the very cool video of its installation at https://www.terisloatfineart.com/ news--events.html






