
I hope everyone enjoys a nice winter break and is looking forward to lots of new creations and adventures in 2024.



After not being able to fill a bus, two carfuls were canceled at the last minute because President Biden was in town and the museum was closed! Then two more carfuls, now with a new mix of people, was scheduled for

Thursday, December 14. Guess what? In the end it was just **Gail Mardfin** and **Judy Goldberg** who made it to the deYoung Open – for a fantastic day together!

It was rewarding to go through the *enormous* exhibit (883 diverse pieces hung salon-style) with someone who also enjoys looking closely at things, figuring out what medium had been used, and commenting on certain eye-catching pieces. We had so much fun. And it was exhausting! So after going through several rooms, we retired to the café where we had a delicious luncheon and then returned for the last four roomfuls of art — on the way, running into AWS member **Barbara Evans**!

We highly recommend that if you can, *get there before it closes on January 7!* And go early! The galleries are more or less divided according to subject matter. As we entered a new room, we might say to each other "Oh, this is the Surrealism room," or "This is the Botanical wall," where we found AWS member **Gail Radice's** oil painting, "Gravenstein Wash" (at right).

Double congratulations to Gail, who sold the painting early on - to someone who lives only blocks from the museum - and has since



received no fewer than 13 more emails inquiring about purchasing the painting, with wonderful compliments and thoughts about what attracted them to it. "Many truly connected to growing up with Gravensteins and the fond memories of their childhood," Gail explains. "One lady stated that she had grown up in upstate NY and my apples made her nostalgic for those days back in NY. Just about everyone I wrote back to wrote back to me again with congratulatory remarks about my sale, and many [said they'd] like to see more of my work. While it hasn't been my intent to do so, it's looking more like I may have to put together some kind of website since I wrote back indicating that I would do just that!

"There is something 'magic' about having a piece in the deYoung. It is seen by thousands during the course of the three-month exhibition, and many go back and back again. There is so much art not to be missed. It's a wonderful show to behold, and I truly love being a part of it. Steven and I will be going back for our third visit next week."





4 Common Mistakes Artists Make

- 1. Ignoring atmospheric perspective. As the subject moves off into the distance, values get lighter and colors become grayer and cooler. Before I learned this, my ground plane wouldn't "lay down." You might not notice this at first but if you bend over and look at the field upside down, the value and temperature shift suddenly becomes obvious! The late Ken Auster once showed me a trick: he mixed up a color to match the grass at our feet. Then he kept adding white to that grass color as the field moved away into the distance. It's a trick, but it's a great trick!
- 2. Misjudging values. We need to remember to keep comparing the values of all the elements in our painting. The darkest elements are closest to us (atmosphere again). The great teacher and author John Carlson described four planes in his book *Carlson's Guide to Landscape Painting*:
 - The dome of the sky is usually the light source.
 - The ground plane is the second lightest. Sloping planes are third.
 - Finally, vertical planes (like tree trunks) are the darkest.
 - Remember to squint and compare the values. It also helps to hold something dark like a black glove or white like a paper towel in front of the scene.
- 3. Composition trumps everything else! At its heart, composition is the distribution of light, middle, and dark masses on the picture plane. In the words of master painter David Leffel, "A painting comprised of a number of small value masses will look small and petty." For centuries artists have made small (2- or

- 3-inch) "thumbnail" drawings in three or four values to test out possible compositions... It only takes a few minutes and can save hours of rework. Now, there's even an app for this. *Notanizer* is available through the app store and can convert a picture into a *notan* (2 values black and white), or three or four-value desaturated images. In seconds you can find a winning composition.
- 4. Too much chroma. The world is much grayer than we think it is. Those "brilliant" fall colors are all shades of gray. Again, put something with saturated color in your scene (hang a red or yellow bandana on a bush) to see how unsaturated the colors in nature really are.
