AWS' first online art show and sale is now available for viewing! 



AWS Board Minutes

April 15, 2021

<u>Members Present</u>: Patty Bird, Jerry Fabiano, Merrie Krisl, Gail Mardfin, Patricia Marina, Deni Marrone, Carol Mills, Fran Nielsen and Lorraine Stribling.

Meeting was called to order at 10:36 by President, Carol Mills.

Possible Harvest Fair Show: Carol talked with the President of the Harvest Fair Board and he said they are planning a fair this year, probably in one pavilion. They discussed having one section for art. Carol will pursue this, although some questions arose about having just our group do the show. Note: we have the virtual show website for one year, so there is the possibility of another show there.

<u>Virtual Show</u>: The Publicity Committee met and divided the PR responsibilities. Hard copy postcards will be distributed at the Sebastopol Center for the Arts from 12-1 p.m. on Thursday, April 29. These can be placed on bulletin boards, etc. If you'd like some, but cannot pick them up, contact Gail Mardfin and she will send you some. Gail sent the long PR plus some pictures to April Lynch for publishing in print media.

Gail reported an issue had come up with viewing the show website. Users of cell phones find the images truncated. If the html code were changed, the images would be quite small and would subvert the intention of providing a close viewing of the artwork. Gail has posted an announcement on the site that it is best viewed on desktops, laptops or tablets. Please tell anyone you notify that it can't be viewed properly on a cell phone.

<u>Venues</u>: Deni reported that the Specialty Center is available for works. Umpqua Bank may be available soon and has two new spaces for display. She is still working on Slice of Life and the Senior Center. A new venue is ready now: Infusions and Sonoma Chocolatiers in Sebastopol has space for about 12 pieces. She will do the first show there to check out the facility.

<u>Program</u>: Vice-President, Jerry Fabiano, announced May's prompt is Nighttime. This could be a scene outside (moonlight, city lights) or inside (artificial light).

<u>Treasurer</u>: Patty reported we have a balance of \$5334.80 in our regular account and \$8537.32 in the Meilke account, which will pay for prizes when we once again have a judged show.

<u>Corresponding Secretary</u>: Fran sent a card to Jerry, for which he thanked us. She will also send one to Linda Nease.

<u>Membership</u>: Lorraine reported we now have 73 members. Carol thanked Gail for the newsletter and website which encourages people to become members.

Meeting was adjourned at 11:36.

Good to see 29 of you at the April meeting! Lots going on!

See page 9 about Carol's Maker's Market announcement. Then Carol presented the idea of AWS having a presence at the traditional Harvest Fair, a big wine-tasting and art event that hasn't happened in a couple of years. Carol was asked to keep that rolling... and we are onboard! She will keep us posted.

Phil Wilkinson announced about Oakmont Art Association's upcoming 2-day

Luan Zhen workshop on June 4 & 5 (see page 3).

Venue Coordinator Deni's doing a bang-up job making connections for further down the road.

Wanting to keep the exhibits in our venues fresh, on the spot Linda Grainger said she would take over Gail's exhibit at the Specialty Center, and Marilyn Sommer volunteered to replace Sky Richardon's pieces at Umpquah Bank. Good job – and we're getting a couple more nails in the wall for more paintings at Umpquah.

Come say HELLO! as we distribute our Virtual Show postcard (see front page) at the Sebastopol Center for the Arts on Thursday, April 29th. Whoops... were you there?

VP Jerry announced May's **prompt of NIGHTTIME** (see front page).

Then the fun began. Kim Winter was our Highlighted Member and she had made a great little 6-minute video, inviting us into her 10x12 country studio (with dogs barking near the chicken coop). Kim scrolled through her art photos on her tablet (in the video) and we saw how prolific she is! She's donated numerous pet portraits for www.petslifeline.org fundraisers (a Sonoma animal rescue/shelter organization), embellishing canvas sneakers with permanent markers or stencil/spray-painting on t-shirts. Kim admires "street art and food art" and she enlivens her latest large, solid

color canvases with stencilled/spray-painted objects, especially cheese. Kim's quirky humor shines through as her burgers, carrots, and fried eggs appear, with black details cut from stencils and sprayed. "I'm kind of a random artist," says Kim. After answering several questions after the talk — like "Why do you stretch your own canvas?" Carol asked for others who'd like to share their art/studio/process. Let Carol know if you're interested! Phil Wilkinson volunteered to be our next month's Highlighted Member, as Sue Rogers will be on the road again.



Paula reminded us to **BE WATER CONSCIOUS**. We are experiencing the worst drought in years. She talked about her children's book (www.SavingWalter.com) which further explains how to conserve water.

Jerry introduced the **Abstraction** segment: "There's no finite answer!" Gail remarked that earlier in the week she had seven submissions but by yesterday she had 30+! All of the pieces that were screenshared are on pages 7-9 — enlarge the newsletter so you can see. It was wonderful to see and hear of people's processes and experiences working in a new way, discovering new methods —

like Judy's cereal box liner to wipe ink off her linoplates or Merrie identifying "mark-making" and how she wanted to approach it. Deni told how she'd embraced working abstractly four years ago with her poured paintings, allowing her to be prolific and experimental. I myself shared seven slides so people could see the progression of my piece, "The Beginning of Time" (page 7). I had a blast and am curious to see the next ones I come up with, as I've ordered three more 3x3 foot canvases (I did NOT stretch them myself...).

GREEN IN THE 19TH CENTURY

"In many cultures, green is the color of rebirth and prosperity, a harbinger of life and spring. However,



placed within the context of the nineteenth century, green begins to represent the dualities of inspiration and melancholia, health and sickness, and life and death. This trend was due to the rising popularity of the spirit Absinthe and the arsenical pigments of Scheel's Green and Paris Green. Paintings, prints, and fashion of the time reveal how this alluring—

yet insidious—color took the century by storm and left a slew of debauchery and death in its wake."

GEORGETTE CHEN: AT HOME IN THE WORLD

I, who used to teach a course called "Women in Art," cannot believe that I have never heard of 20th C artist, Georgette Chen, whose show was recently featured at the National Gallery Singapore!



"Chen is arguably one of the most interesting artists of the twentieth-century, not only because her fascinating life seemed to follow major historical events, but because her art truly had no boundaries. She was Chinese by birth, French and American by education, and Singaporean by



choice. Her paintings are a fusion of techniques, colors, and perspectives. She had chosen the name Chen as her signature.
